**The Novel at a Glance****MORE ABOUT THE WRITER**

Although he spent only a few years in a regular classroom, Woodrow Wilson Rawls learned to love reading at an early age. Winter evenings on the farm, Rawls's mother would read to the boy and his sisters from books bought for them by their grandmother. When their mother grew tired, the children would take turns reading a page or two aloud to each other. Although Rawls didn't care much for the fairy tales that his grandmother favored, his life was changed at the age of ten when his mother gave him a copy of Jack London's *The Call of the Wild*. Rawls carried the novel with him wherever he went; he read it again and again. Working in the fields one day, he decided that he would like nothing better than to write a dog story of his own.

Following the success of *Where the Red Fern Grows*, Rawls often spoke about writing to teachers and young people around the United States. His advice to aspiring writers was to read and write as much as possible. The important thing, he insisted, is to get your story down on paper and not to worry about grammar and punctuation until later. Rawls liked to share a wise saying that he learned from his father—namely, that people can do anything that they set out to do as long as they don't give up.
